## Community Update from Mayor Gary Dorfman

When I speak with folks in town, I often ask, "Why did you decide to live in Millstone?" The responses are many, "I wanted rural, quiet, private, safe, good schools, community programs and low taxes...". Many moved to Millstone from more suburban and urban areas in northern NJ and NY. Most all of us chose to live in Millstone for the special place it is now. The Township Committee and I, and the many community volunteers on our Boards, Councils and Commissions work hard to preserve the special way of life we have here. Without these efforts, Millstone would quickly become like those towns many of us chose to leave. I'd like to extend a special thanks and appreciation to those who volunteer in our community.

Things are well in our town. We passed our municipal budget and once again were able to keep our tax rate flat, maintaining the lowest municipal tax rate in all of Monmouth County. We did this while increasing expenditures into the municipal road program and without cutting community programs. We have worked hard with continued good success receiving various funding grants from State and County funding sources. These grants help us to fund roads, open space, recycling, and many other community programs.

We are not without challenges. We are actively managing the State's court mandated Council On Affordable Housing (COAH) obligations. Deputy Mayor Grbelja has lead our efforts on our plan which addresses these obligations without exposing the town to massive tax increases or large influxes of high density low income housing, presently this plan is in the late stages of acceptance. Recently our town received discouraging news from Trenton regarding State funding for our schools. Governor Murphy and the State Dept. of Education reduced their planned funding to Millstone by an initial \$255,316, on the way to planned \$2+ million reduction in state aid for the Millstone School district. These changes removed State funds from our strong performing, cost efficient school district, and perpetuated the excessive funding to high cost, poor performing districts. I joined the Millstone school's Business Administrator at a meeting in Trenton with the State Commissioner of Education to contest the budget cuts. A formal appeal has been filed. Our thanks to Assemblymen Rob Clifton and Ron Dancer in helping arrange the meeting.

There are several public safety projects in process. We are working with the County to convert the 5-way intersection at Routes 571 & 524 to a roundabout. The project is in the last stages of land acquisition from adjacent property owners in order to start the road improvements, making our community safer.

As our community has changed, there has arisen a need to change our rescue squad services. Formerly a largely volunteer squad, we no longer have been able to manage on a mostly volunteer basis. The Township Committee is working with the remaining volunteers as we transition to rely more on paid services. Words cannot express the appreciation to those who have donated their time and money to this service in the past and those who continue to do so.

You may have noticed what seems like an explosion in the deer population. Beautiful serene and peaceful, yes, but the spike in the deer population is not without consequences, including motor vehicle accidents, the spread of deer related ticks and diseases, and economic losses for our farmers. A study is underway to measure these increases.

The Township Committee has also been working with JCP&L and Verizon to increase trimming of tree limbs and plants adjacent to power and utility lines in town, to minimize outages. Residents can contact the Township Administrator to report poles we should be investigating.

There are many good things on the way in our community. The former Methodist Episcopal Church, preserved as a historical property, is being converted to a community cultural center. This facility will be ideal for small format performances and community events. Interested community groups should contact the Parks and Recreation Department to inquire about usage.

Millstone Park, off Red Valley Road, will open in the Spring. The park includes active and passive recreation for the community, including lighted playing fields, walking and jogging paths, restroom and concession facilities. A beautiful lake with a fishing pier and boat launch is hidden behind the tree line, out of site from the road and ball fields.

On behalf of all the Township Committee members, it is an honor and pleasure to serve the community. We hope you are enjoying your time in our wonderful town.

# HELP KNOCK OUT OPIATES IN NEW JERSEY

Drug overdose is currently the leading cause of accidental death in New Jersey, and the rate of heroin overdose in the state is three times the national average. Many of those affected begin their journey to opiate addiction through legally prescribed pain medications and then move on to heroin when they are unable to afford or obtain these medications.

National and local efforts to curb this major public health problem recognize that public education campaigns are needed to alert citizens in all walks of life to the problem and arm them with information that will allow them to recognize when they and their loved ones are at risk and how they should act.

The Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey annually hosts a Knock Out Opiates Day in New Jersey - **October 6th this year**. It is an opportunity to highlight the extent of the problem in our communities and to provide resources to help schools, workplaces and congregations address the issue.

All too often, it takes tragedy - a teenager or young adult dying from an overdose of a prescription medication that was obtained illegally - to jump-start a community into action. Organizations like the Millstone Alliance to Prevent Substance Abuse can effectively address such issues because of our ability to bring together the right players.

One of our major goals is to educate adults - parents and caregivers - whose role it is to maintain and control the environment in which teens interact with these medications. Another is the school environment, where the Alliance provides funding for youth to learn not only about dangerous substances, but to help them develop coping and refusal skills to endure healthy behaviors and decision-making.

Approximately 1 in 5 teens have abused prescription drugs, and next to marijuana, prescription medications are the most commonly abused substances. Every day, almost 2,500 teens abuse an Rx medication for the first time. They feel that Rx medications are an acceptable and safer alternative to illicit drug use. Many are over prescribed medications for such things as sports injuries, dental work and anxiety.

### Most teens say they use Rx drugs to:

- Concentrate
- Relieve pain
- Deal with problems
- Relax
- Feel better

As part of our outreach efforts the Alliance will be reaching out to prescribers, youth coaches and parents during this month to raise awareness and provide resources. This will be the topic addressed at our October Alliance meeting on October 10th at 7 PM in the Municipal Court Building. Come hear some valuable information provided by professionals in the field and success stories from persons in recovery.

# Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

## *Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water*

### **A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water**

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



**As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.**

### **Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides**

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
  - Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
  - If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.

### **Properly use and dispose of hazardous products**

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.



**Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.**

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



## Keep Pollution out of Storm Drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a storm water system.

## Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



## Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

## Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

## Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pickup and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law.

## And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.
