NOW is the time to spray for bagworms!

Bagworms have a silk case with bits of leaves from the tree or shrub they are feeding on. These bits of foliage turn brown within a couple of days.



Bagworms start to feed at the top of the tree and work their way down. Arborvitae, cedar, juniper, spruces, white pine, and other conifers are preferred, but locust, elm, maple, oak, and poplar are also susceptible. You may even find them on ornamental plants or moving along other objects, such as fences.



Young bagworms are hard to see. That's a bagworm on the dime!



Treatment cannot be done from an airplane; trees must be sprayed from the ground. Conventional insecticides will provide satisfactory results if sprayed NOW!
